To Whom it may concern

We are writing to express our grave concern over the planned deportation of Ms. Mahshid Nezami, an Iranian human rights activist and refugee in Turkey, who is facing imminent danger of being forcibly returned to Iran.

Ms. Mirzaei is a registered asylum seeker under the international protection of UNHCR in Turkey File number 414-16c37720. She fled Iran after being persecuted for her peaceful activities in defense of human rights and democracy. She has been involved in various campaigns and protests against the Iranian regime's violations of civil and political rights, especially the rights of women, ethnic minorities, and prisoners of conscience.

She is under threat of extradition back to Iran, where she would face rape, torture, imprisonment, and possibly execution.

Ms. Nazamihas appealed to UNHCR for urgent intervention and protection. However, she has not received any response or assistance from UNHCR so far. She fears that she could be deported at any moment without due process or access to legal counsel.

We urge UNHCR to take immediate action to prevent the deportation of Ms. Mezami and to ensure her safety and security in Turkey. We also request UNHCR to expedite her resettlement process to a third country where she can enjoy her rights as a refugee and continue her peaceful activism.

The deportation of Ms. Nezami would be a flagrant violation of the principle of non-refoulement, which prohibits the forcible return of refugees or asylum seekers to a country where they face persecution or serious harm. It would also contravene Turkey's obligations under the 1951 Refugee Convention and its 1967 Protocol, as well as the European Convention on Human Rights and other international human rights instruments.

We appeal to UNHCR to uphold its mandate and responsibility to protect refugees and asylum seekers in Turkey, especially those who are at risk of being deported to Iran or other countries with poor human rights records. We also call on UNHCR to work with the Turkish government and civil society to improve the conditions and prospects of refugees and asylum seekers in Turkey, who number at least 3.9 million according to UNHCR's own statistics1.

We appreciate your attention and action on this urgent matter.
